Intellectual Travelators (iT) => Career Escalators require that we-take-control of our on-the-Job Evaluation + Comparison of our Capabilities and Competitive Competencies. **But —**

Instigating your movement up your-organization in a competitive environment can have unfavorable Consequences. So, it must be done Surreptitiously and Circumspectly.

There are **three Processes** we can employ that can move the odds in our favor. You calculate.

Your Opportunity Cost + Risk vs. Reward + actual company employee Performance Monitors/Measures.

Know your Company’s Workflow Structure and your Unit’s responsibilities. This involves the subtle interrogation of:

- 1) The Step before you. Where your workload comes from? = Your **Supplier**, and
- 2) The-Step after you. Where does what-you-do — Go? = Your **Customer**.
 - What can your-supplier do => that will make your job easier?
 - What can your supplier’s Supplier do => that will make your-Supplier’s job easier?
 - What can you-do to make your customer’s job easier?
 - Keep Score! For appropriate leakage/Publishing.
